Twenty-seven volunteers from the New York State Society of CPAs offered their time and advice free of charge.

Readers were extremely grateful.
"I called the IRS and waited 20 minutes and hung up," Joe from New Jersey said after having his question answered by Steve Shinder of Shinder & Shinder.

"I called the Daily News and got right through."

Mary McKinney, a 75-year-old from Cresskill, N.J., felt just as good after speaking with Russell Alesi of WithumSmith+Brown.

McKinney said she has a traditional IRA from which she is already receiving required minimum distributions. She asked if she should convert it to a Roth IRA.

"Typically people of your age don't convert to a Roth A," Alesi told her. "The tax-free earnings from the Roth IRA, would have to exceed the taxes paid on the conversion."

A grandma logged in to The News' live chat to ask Barry Picker of Picker & Auerbach a question about her granddaughter's tuition.

'I gave my granddaughter money last year to help pay her college costs. She is not a dependent of mine. I helped her because her mother (my daughter) was unable to afford to help her. Can I claim this as an education expense on my tax return?" she wanted to know.

You cannot claim it because she is not your dependent," Picker responded. "Sorry."
